Officer reports:

Traveling Journeymen Class, given Nov. 29, 2023 by HL Natalya Alekseya Vasilova

I recently gave a presentation on itinerant journeymen. This is a synopsis of that class. I use A & S projects as a way to learn about daily life in period. Through my research for the recent Kingdom Arts & Sciences competition, I imagined a young German man, Albert Gutekunst, a wood carver. My projects (the first was started about 15 years ago) were intended to highlight areas of personal living history. My carving entry (nested spheres) showed a craft, but was also about philosophy/science; Albert's Journal showed daily life, parts of the guild system we don't really consider in the SCA, and how big events might

impact ordinary people's lives; and Albert's pack was a visual exploration of how someone might travel. I also told of some mistakes I made in the competition. I hope other artisans can learn from them.

Mistake #1--I started the nested spheres before I found a period example. I just thought they were cool. After a year or two, I found actual period examples, which looked nothing like what I was carving. I turned to philosophy and science to explain why Albert chose to make nested spheres in the way he did. I decided that Albert was very religious and wanted to make something beautiful, but also enlightening, showing how God's plan is revealed by science. The layers of the spheres represent all the science known in the 1500's—the four layers represent the four elements—earth, water, air, and fire (or aether). Each layer is carved and shows the center layer, earth (carved with plants) is covered by water (shown by fish, dolphin, otter, and swan), the sphere of air covers them both (where men live and work), and finally, the aether (where angels dwell). Every time I got stuck on the carving, I did persona research, which led me to traveling journeymen and their "Wander year". In Vienna in 1984, I had seen the "Nail-Studded Stump", a place where journeymen carpenters drove a nail as they left town, showing they left their heart there and intended to return. A Wander year was traditionally 3 years and a day, but could be longer. A time of travel and learning was actually required to become a master in many guilds, though some waived the requirement for a fee. Those journeymen who did not travel were often mocked and called "old maids". Itinerant journeymen are known to have been active at least as far back as 1450. I found records of journeymen's travels in many fields—shoemakers, glovers, carpenters, sculptors, painters, etc. Journeys began at the Guild, either a specific craft guild or a guild for journeymen. The journeyman got a kundschaft (work letter) and learned secret handshakes/phrases to verify membership. The kundschaft was a work record and a journeyman could not be employed without it. It included a description of the man and the dates of his employment and was stamped with the town or guild seal. Later it became a wanderbook, which acted as a passport and included the rules the journeyman was to follow (honorable conduct, no begging, no fraudulent work entries) and numbered pages so any bad reviews would be noticed if removed.

Mistake #2—I fell in love with the idea of wanderbooks, even when I found out (about a year ago) they were out of period. Wanderbooks came into use around 1770-1800. I had made a wanderbook for Albert early on and adapted it to the SCA culture, but I should have left it out of my competition entries. Modern traveling journeymen usually travel for 3 months and work for 3 months at a time. In period, I suspect shorter times were common, except during winter, when a journeyman might prefer to winter over in one place. These journeys were not camping, though occasionally the journeyman might stay at "Mother Green's" (outdoors, in Mother Nature). Journeymen usually stayed in inns, hostels, or asked or traded for a place at a farmstead. Journeyman's Guild members began the hostel system, often run by retired craftsmen called "Herbergsvater" (hostel father). They were traveling on roads and paths with villages or towns 2 to 10 miles apart. When a journeyman came to a town or village looking for work, he went to the local tavern or guild hall to see if there were masters willing to take on a journeyman. He would be paid the going daily wage during his tenure and would have to live on those wages during his travels. There were two different gifts that he might receive; one was the Geschenk (Town Gift), which, if accepted, obligated the journeyman to stay in employment for at least two weeks. The other was the Zehrpfennig, a gift from the Journeymen's Guild and might be given if no work was available. My second competition project was Albert's journal of his travels. This gave me a chance to use all the things I had learned about Albert's life to make his story more real. It also meant more research. I had to try to write in the style of a 16th C journal. I tried to present Albert's impressions of what travel was like for ordinary people, what he got paid and what things cost, which meant trying to figure out the names of the coins in use in different areas/countries (I will write another article detailing what I learned about money in period). William Arthur Shaw's book, The History of Currency, 1252 to 1896, was an informative, if exhaustive, survey of monetary systems. I also researched the art and carvings Albert might see as he traveled and make sure it was actually there at the time he was traveling. I mapped out a route for much of Albert's journey, using Albrecht Durer's journal of his trips to Venice and the Low Countries for a reference and using Google Maps for travel times. I figured Albert could travel 10 to 20 miles a day, depending on terrain. I estimated that he traveled about 800 miles in his three year journey. Then there was the overall history, like how the Reformation and Counter-reformation affected the areas Albert was traveling in. I imagined

how the change to the Gregorian calendar would be seen by an ordinary citizen and, since the change happened a different time in different places, how disruptive it might be to a traveler. I tried to use German terms when they were appropriate to the story. Writing the journal as if it was 1580 was a challenge. Period journal grew out of account books and so were not as personal as a modern diary. I read a few autobiographies and parts of period journals and a book about journal writing in the early modem period. The author James S. Amelang had a warning, though—"One must take care not to assume that the wording of the printed autobiographies is necessarily identical to that found in the original manuscript." He meant that what we might read today had probably been through several revisions as it was brought forward in time, with each translator/researcher correcting grammar and phrasing to make the text easier for their readers. Albert's travel pack/kit was my third entry and was the most interactive. This was a lot of speculation and common sense, as there was little firm information about what a man might carry on a journey. I looked at several re-enactor sites for ideas and spent a couple years asking SCA people at events what they would carry on their back for an extended journey. It was in the Misc. category because it didn't fit anywhere else. Judges had trouble with it, especially when they reached the "workmanship" category. The entry included a display board that showed wanderyear info, pack info, illustrations of how to carry items, and a photo of current journeymen (to show the tradition continues to this day). The pack itself weighs about 10 pounds and contains: Outside canvas/duckcloth, should be oiled or waxed; used for tarp, ground cloth, tent; Taup line; to make carrying handle or shoulder strap; Rope, should be hemp rope; to tie pack, use as straps and misc use; Wool blanket; for warmth; Snapsack; a fabric tube tied at the end; cords could be used to carry snapsack separately; Spare shirt/braes; Bowl, spoon, knife, fork, though a pricker might be used instead of a fork; napkin; Metal cup, to drink from and something that could be heated over a fire; Bouillon cubes, for a warm broth when out in the open, Fire starting kit, Soap, comb, for personal hygiene; Money; Tools for his craft; Something for his feet—Stockings or hosen or foot wraps (this is an area for speculation as to which would be most practical and cost effective); Sewing kit, Leather scraps for patching, String Outside the pack, in a bag or pouch, Albert might carry frequently used items—Sketchbook, Pencil, Kundschaft, Devotions book or other personal recreation items like cards, dice, or flute, Work knife, Money pouch (around neck) My judges thought this would be a good demo item. One suggested it should have been a research paper, but I wanted to get people to stop and look and think about the information, which doesn't happen with a written paper.

Mistake #3—I used the same bibliography for all 3 items because there was so much overlap; this was just laziness on my part. The judges of the pack thought I had too many Wikipedia searches listed. I used them to check what the carvings looked like and where they were located, so Albert could travel there and describe them in his journal.
