Period Practice Targets Around the Old World Taught by Kikuchi Yoichii Yoriie October 5, 2025

Archery has been in existence since pre-historic times, used in both peacetime for hunting, and in war for conquest and defense. As such, until the rise of firearms, there has been a vested interest in many cultures to encourage their soldiers to practice in off times to ensure their readiness! As such, I have a brief lecture prepared to go over several of the targets used in more formal archery practices around the Old World through history.

As you may have read in the rules for today's shoot, the "Lucky Target" is based off of 15th century Dutch practices. While today's target was based off a description of the square/diamond versions, there are illustrations showing the same principle but on round targets, similar to what one would see on a modern dartboard.

The Mongols had a variety of targets. Stacked cylinders and round balls made from leather straps, the object being to move them a minimum. However, moving more west and a little south, a pattern emerges. Almost every group used a round target of some type. I will mention these, but I'm hoping to highlight the odd ones. The first example is the Chinese. They had a least some of their archers shooting at a round target on a hide or paper sheet, suspended from a round frame.




Figure 2. Korean target. Taken from https://archeryhistorian.com/archery-targets.

The Koreans used and still use in their traditional archery a box with a round red dot (Figure 2).




Figure 3. Hashi-moto. Taken from https://archeryhistorian.com/archerytargets.

The Japanese use a stuffed straw cylindrical target, later stuffed in a barrel to make it keep its shape after heavy use. often covered in a paper target with a small target circle on it, called a hashi-moto (Figure 3).

Heading back east, the Arabians had stacked circular targets, to represent horseman, where as you increased in skill, you moved to the smaller circles, to represent hitting the shield, and head of your opponent.

Their successors, the Turks, were known to either shoot items off of tall poles (mostly for mounted archers), or at a pear-shaped leather back called a puta! Notice this still has larger shape below, and a smaller shape on top, to be vaguely horseman silhouette shape (Figure 4).


Lastly, we move to ENGLAND. England had a period where archery practice was mandatory, and most of their practices consisted of one of three different target types. One was the familiar round target, often a bare wreath of sticks woven into the correct size as in this picture from the Luttrell Psalter (Figure 5).

Other common targets were "Wands" Often from willow or birch, a vertical plank of about 8 inches wide and 2 foot tall, to represent firing into arrow slits, and the Clout. Pick a spot well off, usually marked with a pole, and the closest arrow to the location is the winner.

This is just a smattering of what was commonly used, and I'm sure there were impromptu contests with all sorts of odd targets, including ones that would totally be considered unsafe by modern standards.




